Dear President DeLaune,

Thank you for your ongoing and steadfast commitment to children's safety. It has been a pleasure working with you to advance the REPORT Act, which for the first time requires big technology companies to report crimes involving enticement of children online. I am investigating harm to children from artificial intelligence (AI). Accordingly, I seek NCMEC's expert opinion and recent data about the impact of generative AI on Georgia children.

Please respond to the questions below by **July 22, 2026**, and please contact my Deputy Chief Counsel, Stephanie Herrmann, at Stephanie_Herrmann@ossoff.senate.gov, with any questions.

1. Please define what it means for a report to NCMEC of suspected online child exploitation to have a "generative AI nexus."
2. NCMEC began tracking the use of generative AI in online child exploitation in 2023. For each year, from 2023 to Q1 2026, please identify, if applicable:
 - a. The number of reports made to NCMEC and made available to U.S. law enforcement where:
 - i. A member of the public articulated that a chatbot is involved in suspected online child exploitation;
 - ii. In the content of a company's report there is a chatbot chat, or the report was made based on a chatbot chat that was flagged; and
 - iii. Generative AI CSAM, including the use of "nudifying" applications and websites, is referenced or is the basis for the report.
 - b. The number of reports with a "generative AI nexus" that were made to NCMEC by members of the public and which were made available to U.S. law enforcement.

- c. The number of reports with a “generative AI nexus” that were made to NCMEC by companies and which were made available to U.S. law enforcement.
 - i. Which companies submitted these reports?
 - ii. Which companies that submitted these reports are companies that have registered with NCMEC to make reports to the CyberTipline?
 - iii. How many of these reports include content, chats, or imagery that references a generative AI technology?
 - iv. Which companies are not currently registered and are not reporting to NCMEC’s CyberTipline, even after NCMEC conducted outreach and provided the reporting protocol? Of these companies, which have had their generative AI platforms referenced in report content?
 - d. The number of reports made available to U.S. law enforcement that NCMEC determined to have a “generative AI nexus” to:
 - i. Online enticement, including financial sextortion;
 - ii. CSAM; or
 - iii. Child sex trafficking.
- 3. For each year, from 2023 to Q1 2026, please identify, if applicable:
 - a. The number of reports made to NCMEC and made available to Georgia law enforcement where:
 - i. A member of the public articulated that a chatbot is involved in suspected online child exploitation;
 - ii. In the content of a company’s report there is a chatbot chat, or the report was made based on a chatbot chat that was flagged; and
 - iii. Generative AI CSAM, including the use of “nudifying” applications and websites, is referenced or is the basis for the report.

 - iii. How many of these reports include content, chats, or imagery that references a generative AI technology?
 - iv. Which companies are not currently registered and are not reporting to NCMEC's CyberTipline, even after NCMEC conducted outreach and provided the reporting protocol? Of these companies, which have had their generative AI platforms referenced in report content?
 - d. The number of reports made available to Georgia law enforcement that NCMEC determined to have a "generative AI nexus" to:
 - i. Online enticement, including financial sextortion;
 - ii. CSAM; or
 - iii. Child sex trafficking.
 - e. The number of reports made available to Georgia law enforcement that NCMEC determined to have a "generative AI nexus" and that were also classified as school-related incidents.
- 4. The number of reports with a "generative AI nexus" that NCMEC made available to Georgia law enforcement between 2023 and Q1 2026 that NCMEC determined were "actionable."
 - 5. The number of reports with a "generative AI nexus" that NCMEC made available to Georgia law enforcement between 2023 and Q1 2026 that NCMEC determined were "not actionable."
 - 6. The number of reports with a "generative AI nexus" that NCMEC made available to Georgia law enforcement between 2023 and Q1 2026 that NCMEC determined to have surrounding "exigent circumstances."
